Sweet corn attracts crowds to roadside stand

Ron Jones turned his truck off of U.S. 82 just west of Lindsay to do some roadside shopping for a golden tasty treat for a second time in a few hours Monday after-

"This is my second time today," said Jones of Saint Jo. "I come every year and buy five to six bags. Last year, I bought 22 bags. It's good sweet corn.

"Whenever I see he's open, I swing in. You have to get it when it's here. When it's gone; it's gone.

Jones is one of the many loyal customers that have made frequent stops at the Fuhrmann Sweet Corn roadside stand in front of the home of Michael Fuhrmann for more than 25 years. Braving the heat and some times long lines of more than 30 people, customers say it's worth it. Especially after getting their bag of 30 ears for

afternoon, Monday Fuhrmann took a brief seat between loads and watched customers line up and his workers that include grandchildren and local youngsters hand out bags full of corn.

"It gets better each year,"

Fuhrmann said. At this point, the farmdoes not advertise his stand and relies on word of mouth and the Web site, www.82sweetcorn.com, which gives updates to customers about the availability of the corn.

Fuhrmann planted 20 acres of corn this year. He opened his stand for the first time Friday.

He can get up to 5,000

ears in a load.
"We've not been filling the trailer all the way," Fuhrmann said. "We've been trying to keep [corn] here. We've only been putting in about 3,000 Continued on Page 4

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Back at the stand, he's added a new feature this year for his young workers, a corn elevator that he built.

"It makes it faster," Fuhrmann said. "They can put five in bag at a time instead of one at a time."

Most of Fuhrmann's workers have been work-ing for him for several years, including Lindsay High School student Dean Fleitman.

"It's hot and hard work," Fleitman said. "I've worked here for three years.

Fellow Lindsay student Austin Reiter echoed Fleitman's thoughts.

"It's hard work and hot, but it's pretty fun," Reiter said. "It stays busy the whole time."

Fuhrmann's stand opens at 8 a.m. each day but Sunday.

With the rush of customers demanding the limited supply, Fuhrmann expects the golden tasty sweet corn to be all gone

"Within two weeks, we'll be out," Fuhrmann said.
